
Let's Understand It

SENTENCE

We use words to convey our thoughts and feelings. But words in isolation cannot convey any meaning. So, we use **groups of words** to convey meaning.

Look at these groups of words:

- Dark clouds were gathering in the sky.
- Were dark clouds gathering in the sky?
- What dark clouds are gathering in the sky!



They begin with a capital letter.

They end with a full stop, a question mark, or an exclamation mark.

These are sentences.

Groups of words that convey a complete thought or meaning and make complete sense are called a **sentence**. A sentence begins with a capital letter and may end with a full stop, a question mark, or an exclamation mark.

A sentence must have a subject and predicate.

TYPES OF SENTENCES

We use different types of sentences to convey our thoughts and feelings, to ask questions, and to give information.

Look at these sentences:

- 1. She is looking pretty in the white dress.
- 2. Is she looking pretty in the white dress?
- 3. How pretty she looks in the white dress!
- 4. Please be careful; you might step on her white dress.
- The first sentence gives information and ends with a full stop.
- The second sentence asks a question and ends with a question mark.
- The third sentence expresses a strong feeling of liking and ends with an exclamation mark.
- The fourth sentence expresses a request and ends with a full stop.

These are the four different types of sentences.
